Essay #2: *Ekphrasis & Remediation: image & text*

GUIDELINES:

You have a variety of works and forms of remediation with which to engage for this essay assignment. Your primary documents are Swensen’s *Such Rich Hour* and also your choice of two of the visual poems (by different authors) published in *Reconfigurations*. Your secondary documents are the definition of *Ekphrasis* (from Wikipedia) and the noted sections from Manovich’s *The Language of New Media*.

After studying the above materials, write your essay in response to this question: ***How and why do your primary works remediate a particular visual field of signification in order to convey with language a unique meaning or story?***

Incorporate evidence (i.e. direct quotation) from all of your primary and secondary sources and provide a works cited page (either MLA or Chicago style). This essay calls for a synthetic, contextual study.
