The Gilman Scholarship Application is open!!

Gilman Scholarships helps students of limited financial means study or intern abroad, providing them with skills critical to our national security and economic prosperity. Students studying critical need languages may be eligible to receive an additional award of up to \$3,000. This application cycle is for credit-bearing programs abroad or virtual international programs that have a start date from May 1, 2021-April 30, 2022. Specific scholarships are also available for child dependents of active duty service members, students who want to study in Israel, Wales or New Zealand, and students studying Arabic, Portuguese, or French.
