

THE BERNARD OSHER FOUNDATION

THE BERNARD OSHER FOUNDATION, HEADQUARTERED IN SAN FRANCISCO, was started in 1977 by Bernard Osher, a respected businessman and community leader. The Foundation seeks to improve quality of life through support for higher education. OLLI at DU is one of The Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes found on the campuses of 125 colleges and universities from Maine to Hawaii and Alaska. Each provides a distinctive array of non-credit courses and activities specifically developed for seasoned adults aged 50 or older who are interested in learning for the joy of learning. The Foundation also provides support to the National Resource Center for the Osher Lifelong Learning Institutes at Northwestern University.

In the fall of 2000, the Foundation began to consider programs targeted toward more mature students not necessarily well served by standard continuing education curricula. Courses often attract students of all ages eager to accumulate units to complete degrees or to acquire specific job skills. By contrast, the interest of many older adults, especially those who have retired, is in learning for the joy of learning--without examinations or grades--and keeping in touch with a larger world.

Beginning in the fall of 2002, the Foundation issued Requests for Proposals to campuses in the California State University and University of California systems. Grants of \$100,000 were made on the understanding that once a lifelong learning institute was launched, the Foundation would consider renewal of the grant for two or more years with a view to providing an endowment gift of no less than \$1 million if the institute was able to demonstrate potential for success and sustainability.

The University of Denver applied and was awarded three grants each of \$100,000 beginning in January 2007 - and OLLI at DU became a reality. With the first grant, OLLI West opened in September, 2007 with 97 members. The second grant was awarded in 2008 and was dedicated to opening OLLI South. As the program achieved early success in the first two years, Osher proceeded to grant OLLI at DU the first \$1 million endowment one year ahead of schedule.

The Foundation has not been highly prescriptive in the type of lifelong learning program it has chosen to support. While one finds considerable variation

among the Osher Institutes, funded programs share a common set of standards to encourage excellence and promote long-term sustainability and success:

- A diverse repertoire of intellectually stimulating, non-credit courses and educational activities, specifically designed for people who are 50 years of age or older;
- Participants are offered membership and significant opportunities for volunteer engagement and leadership;
- Strong support from the host institution (including a commitment to provide space or cause space to be provided for program operations); and
- A sound and stable organizational structure.

Currently, there are 125 Osher Institutes in 340 cities and towns with 113,299 OLI members.

The Foundation has a nine-member Board of Directors, chaired by the Honorable Barbro Osher, Honorary Consul General of Sweden in California.




A Year of Significant Staffing Changes for OLLI at DU

Barbara Ratcliffe, who had maintained the position of Executive Director for over five years and who had admirably led the program through the pandemic, resigned for family reasons in September, 2021. Deborah Brackney came onboard as the new OLLI at DU Executive Director in August, 2021. Unfortunately, because of health reasons, Deborah resigned and Dara Hughes (OLLI West Manager) was made Interim Director in November, 2021. In the short 6+ months Dara was Interim Executive Director, she accomplished several important tasks including simplifying and changing the registration process to a single step process (significantly reducing the number of calls and emails asking about the registration process); and finalizing plans for the new OLLI Regis site which will open in fall 2022. After a successful search for a permanent director, Jacqueline Wyant (formerly OLLI-on-Campus Manager) was selected as the new OLLI at DU Executive Director in May, 2022.

As DU Dean Michael McGuire stated, *“These are indeed dynamic times for all of us, and finding the next OLLI at DU Executive Director is critically important to keeping OLLI at DU a thriving and accessible Community as well as a national model for impactful lifelong learning.”*

In addition, this year one Site Manager and six new program assistants were hired.

Our DU OLLI Sites Enjoyed a Successful 2021-2022 Year - Despite the Pandemic!

OLLI at DU is proud to report that, even with the challenges of offering lifelong learning opportunities during the pandemic, we continued to meet the needs of our many members, both near and far! This year, although we offered most of our courses online, we opened our doors at four of our locations for in-person courses. We want to thank the incredible staff members and volunteers who made this happen- our facilitators, class assistants, curriculum committee members, and event planners. As we continue to emerge from the pandemic, we are looking forward to offering a robust program of both in-person and online courses, webinars, social events, and group meetings.

Since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, **OLLI at DU Boulder** shifted its focus from in-person courses to meeting members’ needs through a robust offering

of Zoom courses. This upcoming fall term of 2022 will launch our return to our church home for in-person classes at Mountain View United Methodist Church in south Boulder. We have been working with the church leadership this year to begin courses again and have a wonderful new setup that we know members will enjoy. We will also continue to offer a strong series of Zoom courses, as these



remain quite popular since their inception. We have had transitions with our staff as well as our volunteer curriculum committee, so this year has been one of change and adjustments that have been met with resilience and a positive attitude. We remain extremely proud of all those who work so hard to keep OLLI at DU Boulder a thriving part of the OLLI organization.

Wow - what a great year **OLLI Central** has had despite all the pandemic, personnel and venue changes. The virus continued to play havoc on decision making. Online? In Person? Combination? How many of each and who can facilitate in one, or the other, or both? What happens if during in person we need to go back to online? The common good news thread throughout were our outstanding curriculum committee members, our OLLI-wide staff including our interim executive leadership and all the volunteers who made it all happen with great success. We have not witnessed so many balls in the air with many moving

parts. But we came out on the other end with a great sense of satisfaction from all, including from our loyal members who withstood the storm with a smile. But no doubt we could not have been close to success if it were not for the forty some Central facilitators who remained flexible with all the need for new learning and unexpected changes they had to endure. And with all this it is a great compliment to those brave facilitators as demonstrated by some examples of the many acknowledgements given to them from our members. 




Central is proud of being part of the OLLI team whose unselfish contributions made it all happen. We are looking forward to next year. We are ready for it.

Our **OLLI East** members had such a great experience during this year's online fall and winter terms engaging in our site's course offerings. Our courses were engaging, thought-provoking, and just FUN. In Winter Term 2022, we launched the Leading-Edge Medicine Lecture Series. All speakers were current or former faculty members at the University of Colorado School of Medicine Anschutz Medical Center in Aurora. The lectures addressed topics related to pandemics and COVID-19 as well as health issues common among older adults. We hosted an in person open house in March, prior to spring term. This was the first time we had gathered together in person in two years. It was well-attended with the keynote speaker U.S. Representative Jason Crow (D-6th Congressional). As a member of the Armed Services Committee and House Intelligence Committee he addressed developments in Ukraine. Chris Evan-Klock, an OLLI facilitator who retired from a 25-year career with the UN in 2019, addressed the United Nation's current and potential role in Ukraine in terms of conflict-resolution, security, and humanitarian crisis response. Spring term reflected lower enrollment with in-person classes than in the past as members gradually emerged from their pandemic cocoons. We heard many comments from our members that online Zoom courses continue to offer a lifeline to stay engaged and connected. We also observed many happy smiles when we were finally able to gather in-person and see friends again!

The **OLLI-on-Campus** program has grown exponentially since our inception five years ago and we have seen the most growth since the pandemic and the emergence of online course delivery. The instructors of the OLLI-on-Campus program come from multiple universities in Metro Denver and South Dakota, California, and Florida. We even have an instructor who gets up very early in Australia who teaches some of our music appreciation courses. During the 2021-2022 academic year, the program offered 54 courses and 22 webinars led by 46 instructors and speakers. We had 2084 registrations for these offerings. In November, because of our increasing size,

we were able to hire a Site Program Assistant, Mitra Verma. OLLI members enrolling in our OLLI-on-Campus courses had such a great experience during this year's programming engaging in courses such as the History of Photography, Travel (Route 66, New Zealand, Greece, Hidden Colorado), Genealogy, Art & Music Appreciation, Writing, Meditation, Mindfulness and Hands-on Art courses. With the advent of the new academic year, OLLI-on-Campus welcomes a new Site Manager, Maria Elena Garcia. Maria Elena will continue to focus on providing courses for our members that stimulate all parts of the mind and body which are taught by professors, authors, and experts in their fields.

It has been a busy, exciting and active year for **OLLI South** as the program moved out of their home location of 10 plus years in May 2020. Everything was moved into storage, as they looked for a new location and got through the pandemic. In the fall of 2021, a new location was found, and contracts signed. An open house took place in February 2022 and was a huge success with approximately 100 people attending. Everyone loved checking out the new location but especially seeing old friends again in-person, not just on a screen. OLLI South offered 6 in-person classes in the spring and they were a huge success, this is addition to the wonderful online courses they continued to offer. As we moved from the pandemic it was important to start rebuilding the OLLI South community. A new Community Building Committee was formed and has been charged with creating a quarterly newsletter updating everyone on OLLI South activities; planning different activities for our members; and marketing our site. At the end of the academic year South hosted a facilitator celebration brunch – a time to celebrate and thank all our dedicated facilitators. Since we haven't been able to come together for a few years, anyone who facilitated for OLLI South over the last three years was invited. It was a great success and everyone enjoyed being together.



OLLI West had much to celebrate this past academic year despite the many challenges put in front of the staff, committee members, and facilitators. The year started off with a new Site Manager, Dara Hughes, and new Program Assistant,

Michele Eckert. In November, Dara was asked and accepted the Interim OLLI Executive Director role. Michele graciously accepted to take on the Interim West Site Manager role even though she had only been with OLLI less than four months.

After an eleventh-hour cancellation of in-person classes for the winter term in 2021, OLLI West successfully launched back to in-person classes for the spring 2022 term. For the first time in two years, our members were able to return to a modest but inspired selection of eight in-person classes at a tour host facility, the Jefferson Unitarian Church (JUC) in Golden. It was so great to see many familiar faces once again as well as many new ones. The curriculum committee members and facilitators also came up with safer ways to hold in-person classes offering many outdoor classes with great success. A total of four Geology Underfoot classes exploring Rocky Mountain National Park and three Golden Area walks gave our member a chance to reconnect with nature. OLLI West facilitator, Larry Tannenbaum, worked with staff to initiate, plan, and market an OLLI at DU sponsored trip to Memphis for this fall. This trip ushered back the OLLI at DU Worldview program that had been suspended due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Although the pandemic restricted the in-person experience and the attendant social benefits of getting together for continuous learning and other OLLI events, it also opened the door to remote learning on Zoom and the complete OLLI catalog to members all over that metro area and even some in other states who might not otherwise travel to distant OLLI at DU sites. OLLI On-line will certainly have a permanent place in OLLI's future. West ended the year on a high note with spring enrollment numbers higher than last year's and almost back to pre-pandemic numbers!

OLLI at DU WorldView Program

The OLLI at DU WorldView travel program continues to expand the horizons of the OLLI at DU travelers. Because of the pandemic the program has been on hiatus for some time. However, this year plans have been put in motion and the program is now active again with an OLLI sponsored trip to Memphis scheduled for November, 2022.




OLLI AT DU BY THE NUMBERS...2021-2022

Note: Since opening on-line classes, two interesting and important data emerged relating to current trending regarding OLLI at DU registration numbers: 1) the average number of courses a member takes has doubled from 2 classes to 4 classes per term; 2) the number of members taking courses at multiple OLLI sites has increased six-fold from 12% to 74%.
