# AND Now, A BIT OF REFLECTION...

#### A Pandemic Strikes

ARLY MARCH OF 2020 THE NEWSPAPER AND TELEVISION HEADLINES WERE CROWDED WITH INFORMATION ABOUT A VIRUS which had started elsewhere and was now sweeping the United States. As we had heard of other virus outbreaks and even 'pandemics' such as SARS and Eboli, none had really impacted us to any great degree. Therefore, it seemed best to simply move forward in our normal process.

OLLI at DU was in the final stages of preparing to launch our spring 2020 term in person, at eight locations around the metro Denver area. We had over two thousand (2,055) members registered, two hundred and twenty-six courses ready to begin, and were three weeks from the launch of our spring term.

The OLLI staff held its monthly meeting the morning of March 9. An unplanned agenda topic was how to handle any possible concerns of the church locations due to what seemed to be an ever-expanding potential impact of this new virus. It was being called COVID-19. Our solution was to have each OLLI site manager check in with their church/site staff to see their thoughts.

As each hour ticked by and each conversation was held, it seemed the virus loomed ever larger. Until Wednesday, March 11, The World Health Organization (WHO) declared the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak a global pandemic and suddenly the world changed overnight.

The University of Denver asked each department to determine how best to work remotely; then the University of Colorado declared they would be shutting down their campus with all faculty and staff working remotely); the next day on March 12, the University of Denver declared the same intention beginning the next week.

The staff of OLLI at DU held their first-ever Zoom staff meeting aided by Ron Moon (who supports OLLI at DU with technology) and led by OLLI Executive Director, Barbe Ratcliffe. At this meeting we determined we needed to cancel our spring 2020 term; refund the member payments; and look into the potential or consider the possibility of how we might shift to online learning. The first of many member communications went out on Friday, March 13 (yes, a Friday the 13th) advising members of the decision to close spring term and asking them to let us know if they would like a refund or would like to donate their spring membership fee to keep OLLI at DU financially healthy.

From Monday morning to Thursday afternoon, we had gone from a possible need to prepare for potential COVID member illness to closing our entire spring term - it was a crazy week. Little did any of us know the possibilities and the craziness ahead of us!

#### The OLLI at DU Response

The OLLI at DU staff is not hired for their technological ability. However with the strong, sometimes even obnoxious encouragement from several of our 'IT friendly' members, we began the first of many meetings to determine how we might keep OLLI at DU alive and potentially even thriving during this pandemic. While the staff was very busy responding to member questions and concerns; processing refunds for both credit card and check payments; and responding to church/site issues, Barbe met with twenty OLLI at DU members to discuss the possibility of offering a spring term utilizing the Zoom online platform. On Tuesday, March 17, we determined it was worth the effort to move onto the Zoom platform.

The staff at this time consisted of thirteen (13) wonderful individuals; all working part time, (between 10-20 hours a week); and none having 'signed up' to assist OLLI at DU in surviving a pandemic.

The things we did not know:

- The Zoom platform: The entire staff had to understand the possibilities of the platform and become comfortable with it. We would have to train facilitators and members! With the average age of OLLI members, volunteers and staff none of us were raised in the age of automation. We had no idea how this might work. At this point we added two wonderful individuals to our OLLI at DU staff, John Lungerhausen and Dorothy Emery. Both with IT backgrounds and skill.
- OLLI Facilitators: Would any of our amazing facilitators be willing to offer a course on this very different platform? OLLI at DU prides itself in offering primarily discussion courses. What would the facilitators have to do to provide discussion courses on Zoom?
- Skills Needed to Facilitate on Zoom: What skills did we need to provide to the facilitators who were willing to be the early adaptors...the Zoom Pioneers for OLLI at DU?
- Members: If we had enough courses to offer (how many would be enough?), would any members be willing to learn this new IT platform? Zoom is a very different learning model than we were accustomed to. Would members be willing to learn new software which did not provide them with their much-loved social interactions?
- Did we have enough time and energy to put this all together?
- And a myriad more questions that we had not even considered...

## Some Staff Comments Sharing Their Experience...

## John Baumgartner, OLLI Central Site Manager

Now what should we do? That was the question we all had when realizing that in-person OLLI classes were not going to work for the Spring of 2020 and who knows how long after that. Then the suggestion from our fearless leader, Barbe Ratcliffe, that we should try online. "What do you all think?" she asked. For me and I imagine other staff members, we were skeptical at best. Is her elevator going to the top floor? How do we go online? With what tools? Will our older members show up using digital devices? And what about getting facilitators to go online? And if everyone says go - how are we going to pull this off just a few short weeks away? We need training at staff, volunteer, facilitator and member levels. And although with much anxiety for us and I am sure from Barbe, we pulled it off. And the bottom line is for four straight terms OLLI Online can be categorized as a rousing success both financially and with member satisfaction. In fact, at this time we ask will members want to remain in an on-line mode combined with in-person classes? And as for me, I could not be prouder of the OLLI Online outcome.

# Sherilee Selby, OLLI South Assistant

Spring of 2020, in the midst of COVID, was an evolutionary time for OLLI at DU and for me personally. I did not want the spring term to be cancelled, yet I was extremely hesitant about offering the term on Zoom, as technology is not my strong point. The numerous trainings felt overwhelming. The responsibility for supporting facilitators with my limited Zoom experience was daunting. However, because I believe in lifelong learning, I knew it was something I needed to tackle along with the other staff members. The first few weeks were difficult. Facilitators were as uncertain as I was about the working of Zoom. Supporting and encouraging facilitators while at the same time feeling unprepared myself took a bit of "faking it." Learning to manage Zoom along with OLLI members, who were also learning, was a unique challenge. Regardless, we all survived. We have been successful. It all works so smoothly now! Who knew? And I continue with my lifelong learning...each and every training or meeting on Zoom offers a new teaching moment for me.

## Barbara Darling, OLLI Boulder Site Manager

Before the pandemic, I had never heard the word Zoom. So, when OLLI Execuive Director, Barbe Ratcliffe, said we were taking all of OLLI at DU online, via Zoom, I really had no idea what that meant. I credit Barbe and the OLLI staff as we realized to keep OLLI viable, we had to offer a safe alternative to in-person learning. And, we did it! Fast! Now, we even have members who prefer Zoom classes. I praise the resilience of OLLI at DU and its members and staff for this remarkable transition. It definitely proves that Curiosity Never Retires!

## John Lungerhausen, OLLI Tech Support

Within just a day or two of the cancellation of the OLLI 2020 in-person spring term, the ever-intrepid Barbe Ratcliffe asked if we would be willing to help explore the possibility of using DU's online platform to establish an OLLI online term. It was a daunting challenge. My own experience with online meeting software in my pre-retirement life had been dismal. It was unstable at best and prone to all manner of technical problems. Maybe it was better now. Zoom was the platform. Spring term was the target. Success could be life blood for OLLI at DU, but the risks were high as well. Understanding Zoom technology was just the beginning. We had six maybe seven weeks to put together a fully functional online OLLI spring term. Yikes – we did it!

## **Dorothy Emery, OLLI Tech Support**

When OLLI contacted me in late March of 2020 and said they were going online and wondered if I would be interested in helping as Zoom tech support, my first thoughts were 1) "Wonderful—I have something to do during lockdown"; 2) "What's Zoom?" Because I have a tech background, I never had any doubt that we could get this done but I also had no real idea whether or not we could manage a smooth transition to this new environment. At first those of us "training" facilitators and members seemed to be only a day or two ahead of those we were training. We were definitely learning on the job. With a lot of hard work for a lot of people (staff and facilitators), I felt our team of life-long learners came through with flying colors in the end.

## OLLI Spring Term 2020

s the staff continued to wind down our in-person spring term classes including working with the churches to retain as many relationships as possible, dealing with our members (both those who donated their in-person spring term fees and those who asked for them to be returned), we began work with a small group of volunteers and staff to determine how best to move forward on the Zoom platform.

What we did not know....AGAIN!

- The Zoom platform would it be a good experience for our members?
- And if it was, how would we go about preparing our facilitators and staff for courses on the Zoom platform?
- How proficient did the staff need to be?
- How best could we support the facilitators who, generally knew nothing about Zoom, yet were so committed to OLLI at DU that they would 'do their best' while the vast majority of the staff knew nothing?
- What type course would work best? Discussion? Movie courses (which made no real sense as every member could sit at home and watch a movie)? Lecture courses (although the vast majority of our members really liked the interaction during a course)? What would be the best type course?
- And on and on it went...

With knowing that we really did not know anything, we proceeded forward... building an online course offering based upon what our facilitators and instructors were willing to offer; holding trainings; meeting every day to determine what we knew and did not know and what we needed to know and what next; losing sleep as more decisions were necessary and more unknowns came to light.

In short, this was a harrowing, dynamic, stressful, collaborative, and exceptionally scary time!

We created new terms:

**Zoom Room Host** - OLLI staff person setting the Zoom meeting, opening the class, welcoming and supporting the facilitator and members.

**Zoom Tech Support** - OLLI member volunteers who had a comfort with IT.

**Class Assistants** - Not a new term, an expanded responsibility. OLLI volunteers willing to step into this role with little to no Zoom knowledge...again, a simple desire to keep OLLI at DU alive.

## **Communications and Training**

Barbe communicated with the entire OLLI at DU member base each week, letting them know what was occurring and our intended timeline.

Training sessions were held with facilitators and instructors, often group-led as we all learned together.

OLLI member Zoom Orientations were held as we shared how we would be conducting our courses on Zoom, the role of the member, and the role of the facilitator/instructor. Our largest of these orientations had more than 260 members and staff attending at one time - an incredible tribute to our OLLI members.

And on it went, sometimes as many as six (6) training session a day, all on Zoom – now our only way to connect.

## Spring Term (albeit short) Online Timeline

- Friday, March 13, 2020 We announced the closing of our traditional inperson spring term.
- Tuesday, March 17 We decided to attempt an online spring term using the Zoom platform.
- Friday, March 27 The OLLI Online website was built, with the intention we would only use it for the spring term of 2020. We were sure we would be back in class in the fall.
- Friday, March 27 We had identified fifty-four (54) courses to launch our first online term. Before the catalog was complete, we had a total of eighty-five (85) courses.
- Friday, March 27 Each course had to have a separate fee...there was no time for our traditional 'open registration'. This was a first for OLLI at DU, an organization who was turning twenty-five (25) years old.
- From Friday, March 27 to Saturday, April 4, an OLLI at DU catalog of online courses was built, edited, changed, added to and OLLI Online became real.
- Monday, April 6 OLLI at DU launched online registration for its first online term. Member experience sessions were held, facilitator review sessions were held, and somewhere in the midst of all of those sessions and the challenges that occur with any registration period, the staff was able to catch a bit of sleep.
- Tuesday, April 21 OLLI at DU opened its first online course for the reconstituted spring term. A total of 88 courses (some added at the very last minute) and over 900 members and guests joined OLLI at DU Online an incredible feat!

# OLLI Spring Term 2020 (continued)

OLLI at DU had 'turned on a dime' (as the saying goes) from an in-person lifelong learning organization to an online lifelong learning institute. Over eighty facilitators and instructors were willing to experience online facilitation and instruction and over nine-hundred members were willing to join this amazing adventure.

What had gone from a possibility on March 17, became a successful reality by April 22, five short eventful weeks of decisions, frustration, learning and relearning and learning again.


OLLI at DU not only survived the pandemic – OLLI thrived! The summer brought staff together to regroup and realize that fall term would be online as well.

# OLLI at DU by the Numbers...2020-2021


430	Courses offered - all on the Zoom platform.
29	OLLI at DU email addresses used to offer the 430 online courses. 15 email addresses were added so we were able to offer the courses on the University of Denver Zoom Enterprise platform, providing greater security for our members.
2002	Unduplicated members32% decrease from the previous year, due largely to the impact of the shift to all online courses on the Zoom platform.
488	Brand new members, nearly all coming from out of the Denver metro area and out of areas serviced by other OLLI programs across the country.
4369	Total members enrolled (members taking one or more classes) – a reduction of 22 % from previous years. This reduction is less than the unduplicated member reduction as each member took a greater number of terms (3 terms offered a year).
1	New Site – OLLI Online! We retained our staff for each site to be able to return to in-person courses winter term 2022.
427	Volunteer facilitators presented classes on the Zoom platform. Not only did these amazing individuals create amazing courses, they did so online.
