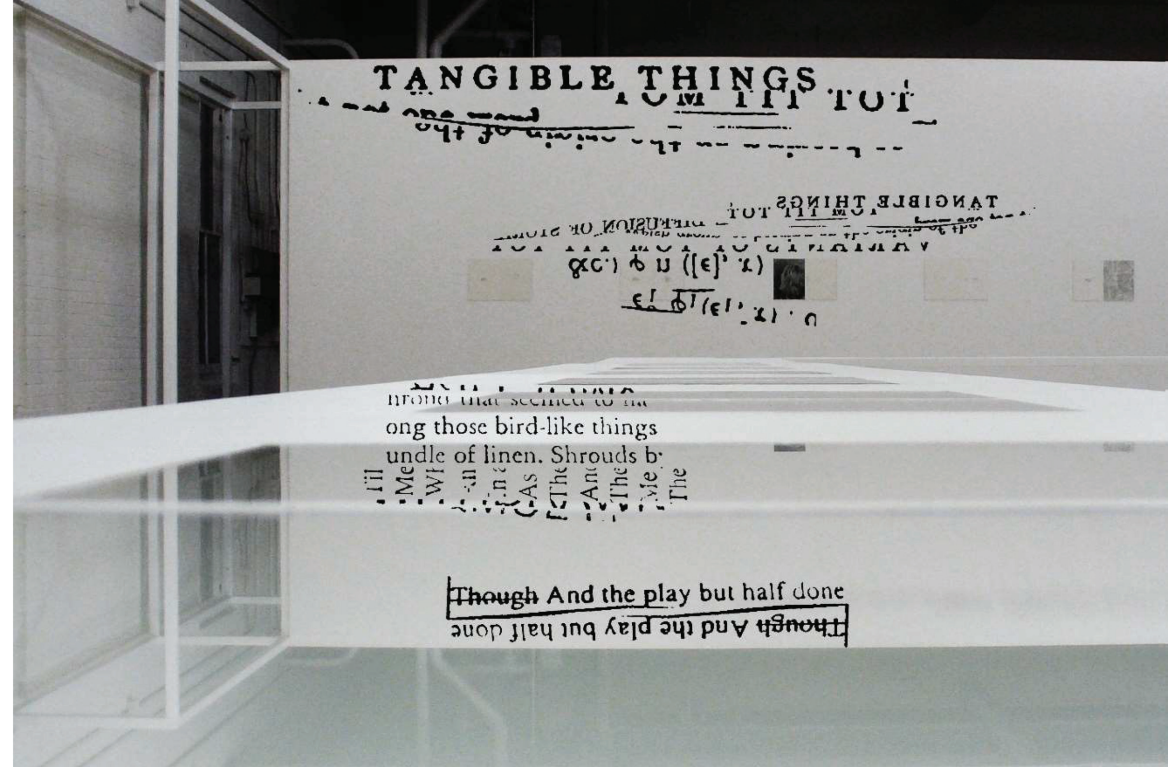


W. Scott Howard • Archive and Artifact

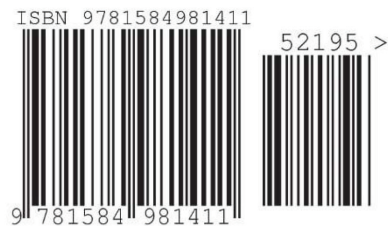
