Public Opinion – The Good News

- Obama: The Bully Pulpit
- Survey Published March 2016
 - 70% believe global warming is real
 - 61% US should reduce GHG emissions even if other countries do not

Public Opinion – The Bad News

- Climate attitudes are now partisan
- More liberal, more concern
- Liberal Democrats: 24% of registered voters
- Rank of climate change for L.D.: 6 of 23




Public Opinion on RE – The Good News

- Large majorities want more solar and wind
- Even split on natural gas and nuclear
- Large majorities want decrease in coal and oil
- Consistent over more than 10 years
