The opportunity to engage in the interdisciplinary sustainability research center would increase attraction and retention of excellent faculty and students interested in sustainability and interdisciplinary work.

The interdisciplinary sustainability research center would add significantly to the University's capacity to help community partners solve problems associated with urban growth, environmental quality, and social justice. As Denver – a city known for its quality of life – grows dramatically these

will be the problems are partners are most likely to bring to us.
The interdisciplinary sustainability research center could support a community economic development clinic (like the one which already exists at the law school) with a new focus on sustainability.
The interdisciplinary sustainability research center could support student-faculty collaboration in developing problemoriented courses – integrating campus and town.
The interdisciplinary sustainability research center could support entrepreneurial sustainability efforts in transportation, energy generation and food production (i.e. the charge of SI 3: Sustainable DU under the One DU transformative direction)
The interdisciplinary sustainability research center would provide portal for community partners, the clear connection between campus and a scaled approach to sustainability at the city, regional, and international scale.
