Participants will be introduced to the theory & practice of community organizing & how other professional disciplines can effectively support, strengthen, & amplify mass movements for social change. The concept of a "regenerative future" will be examined for how it goes beyond the limitations of a sustainability paradigm & analyzed from the lenses of social justice & power, privilege, & oppression. The special case of the climate crisis & ways to address it regeneratively will be explored in-depth, as one example of creating a regenerative future.
