IEC Position Statement: Acknowledgement of Hate Crimes against Black Persons

This past week, the nation has been inundated with videos of a white police officer in Minneapolis and a white woman in Central Park engaging in intentional, racially motivated, hate crimes. Their overt and covert white supremacy (see Figure 1) has once again highlighted the great strides we as a country must make to end systemic, lethal racism.

- Donate to the GoFundMe for George Floyd.
